ABC School Board Discusses School Safety Requirements

The mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Florida sparked a public response by ABC Superintendent Dr. Mary Sieu and members of the School Board at the March 6 meeting.

Expressing sorrow over the shooting where 17 students and staff members were killed, Dr. Sieu said "ABC should provide our 31,000 students with a safe and secure campus. We owe it to our families to return each of the students to them healthy and alive."

She said, "ABC schools are required by law to update their school plan annually for the safe-

ty of their students and staff. This includes a safety plan and evacuation program and an ongoing security program, with each school having an evacuation site so parents will know where to go to find their children."

Cameras have also been installed at every school campus, paid for by one-time funds from the state. She said the District is working very closely with the Sheriff's Department, both in Cerritos and Lakewood, to ensure the safety of the students.

"ABC also has an ongoing research program to reduce possible future problems. If you see something, say something, she concluded." It was also noted the

District will have a new website operating within the next two months.

Cerritos Captain Joseph Nuñez said not only is the District working hard to keep its students safe, but it is necessary for the community-at-large to be alert. He said the city council and city manager are not only concerned about the safety of the community but also our schools.

He said as a grandparent he has a concern about the safety of our children, to see we have the resources to keep our community safe. He also said it is important that if parents have one or more guns in the house, they need to keep them safely locked up and inform their children how dangerous they can be. They are not a toy.

School Bond Task Force

In other business, the trustees unanimously agreed to move forward with the selection of a task force to inform the public-at-large about the exact needs of the District's schools are. Each board member will name two representative to serve on the task force.

This will replace the Facilities Ad Hoc Committee, which over the past two years visited the District schools to determine their specific needs. The task force, working with consultants, will determine costs and reach out to the community-at-large to inform them what is needed and costs.

Cerritos Council Approves License Plate Readers

The Cerritos City Council at its March 8 meeting approved adding two Automatic License Plate Reader (ALPR) Technology for two additional sheriff patrol vehicles in hopes of reducing residential burglaries.

In his report to the council, Public Safety Manager Daryl Evans said adding two additional ALPR patrol vehicles to the Cerritos Sheriff Station fleet will allow each LASD vehicle on routine patrol to be equipped with ALPR technology.

Cost of leasing the ALPR equipment for a LASD patrol vehicle is \$4,650 annually or \$12.23 per day. He said the lease price for ALPR equipment is based on a cost-recovery model amortized over five years. After five years the lease payments are discontinued. In early 2008, the city was one of several cities that served as

a testbed for the LASD during the initial deployment of ALPR technology.

Evans explained patrol vehicles equipped with ALPR technology have four roof-mounted, high-resolution, infrared capable digital cameras and a high-performance computer that automatically photographs, geo-tags, and instantly checks the license plate number of every vehicle that passes within range of the ALPR cameras against government enforcement data systems.

He said within seconds scanned license plate data is recorded and archived which then can be utilized by detectives during an investigation to locate possible witnesses and suspects. Currently there are 67 ALPR vehicles deployed within the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department jurisdictional area.

Cerritos Heightens Active Shooter Safety Efforts, Training



In light of recent school shootings across the nation, the City of Cerritos has taken efforts to reinforce the safety measures and training that are in place to address the possibility of an active shooter in Cerritos.

Recently, Cerritos Sheriff's Station supervisors and deputies hosted active shooter training sessions at Whitney High School, Gahr High School, Haskell Junior High School, Tetzlaff Middle School, Quest Academy, and Valley Christian High School. Similar training is scheduled to be presented at four additional Cerritos schools by the end of

the month. Cerritos deputies have also provided active shooter training to local businesses through the Cerritos Chamber of Commerce and various community service groups.

All Cerritos deputies have received active shooter response training and have immediate access to special weapons, enhanced ballistic armor, and breaching tools which allow them to swiftly engage an active shooter. Cerritos Reserve Deputies, who donate 16 hours of time per month, will be patrolling exclusively near Cerritos schools for the remainder of the school year.

On the crime front, a search warrant was served by Huntington Beach Police Department SWAT team on Pires Avenue



Cerritos Sheriff's Station Is Safe Zone for Online Exchanges

The Cerritos Sheriff's Station lobby and parking lot are available as safe locations for buyers and sellers to meet to complete online transactions. The Cerritos Sheriff's Station lobby is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

While online buying and selling can be easy and convenient, the practices also come with risks. Allowing a stranger to come to your home or other location to pay for and pick-up an item can be a threat to your safety.

When meeting people to buy or sell items, heed the following tips:

- Meet at a reasonable time of day, preferably during daylight.
- Don't meet alone or with children present. Have someone accompany you.
- Don't hand over the item until you have the cash in hand.
- Avoid meeting at your home. If the item is too large to transport easily, consider placing it in the garage or on the porch/entry way. Arrange a meeting in a public place first (and bring a friend) to see proof of identity.

If you're comfortable, allow the person to follow you home. If the buyer has brought someone, keep them together in your presence. The less they see or have access to your home and personal belongings, the better.

• If you agree to meet at a neutral location, consider a well-

lit area with people around and video surveillance cameras, such as the Cerritos Sheriff's Station lobby or parking lot. Don't meet in an area that's unfamiliar or uncomfortable to you. If the other party is not willing to meet you in a place you feel safe, don't meet.

- When purchasing items, inspect them for accuracy and be sure you're getting what you want. It's okay to change your mind and not purchase the item(s).
- If a deal seems too good to be true, it usually is. There are a lot of stolen items sold online. Drug users may sell things at extremely discounted prices just so they can get money for a fast high. Contact the Cerritos Sheriff's Station at (562) 860-0044 if you think something is stolen.
- Be careful with your money. Don't open your wallet and pull money out in front of the seller. Have the exact amount agreed upon in a specific pocket.
- If paying online, use credit cards or secure payment services instead of debit cards.
- When making online purchases in public, use your mobile phone network instead of WiFi.

Here's what you can expect from us: we will keep track and push for progress from our elected leaders who promised to create a real solution for our homeless neighbors.





In other business, the council approved a bid in the amount of \$115,885.52 for an updated Cerritos Library Radio Frequency Identification System to Bibliotheca, LLC. City Librarian and Marketing Manager Annie Hylton said the Cerritos Library offers a collection of approximately 263,555 items, including books, books on CD, music CDs, DVDS and Blu-ray Discs.

Each item in the library's collection is tagged with a radio

frequency identification (RFID) tag that allows patrons to use self-checkout stations to check out library books.

It also provides inventory security, as an alarm is sounded if a patron walks out of the library with an item that has not been checked out. She said the library has been informed the sole manufacturer of the proprietary tags has discounted production of the product necessitating a replacement.

Board Member Maynard Law said if the District was looking at a bond issue, then another smaller committee was needed to determine what steps need to be taken.

Board member Dr. Ernie Nishi suggested the District not lose the resources and expertise of the current members of the Facilities Committee. Board member Chris Apodaca agreed. Law agreed but noted while their expertise was

needed, the bond process was bigger and other people, with the expertise, needed to become involved.

Dr. Sieu suggested they bring back the Task Force discussion at the Board's March 20 meeting. She said the Task Force Committee needs to be aware of the District's Master Plan. "It is also important that the community-at-large understand the needs of the schools and become involved."

Sex Trafficking: In Plain Sight

The root of the problem with Human Trafficking is that it is widely mislabeled within society. This allows traffickers to exploit the lack of knowledge and continue to profit. Homeland Security defines Human Trafficking as, “modern day slavery and involves the use of force, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act. Sexual performances, pornography, and prostitution are acts done in exchange for any item of value, such as money, drugs, shelter, food, or clothing.”

Such actions are labeled as commercial sex acts, yet society continues to describe commercial sex acts as separate from Human Trafficking. The root of the problem needs to begin with understanding what it is and how it should be defined within society. Only then can we as a community begin to understand how to eradicate it.

Pornography and prostitution have their own stigmas and definitions, but are acts that constitute human sex trafficking. The high demand for sexual exploitation allows the industry to grow.

Fight The New Drug, an or-

ganization that provides individuals with facts regarding pornography, states, “we learn of more and more situations where women are lured into human trafficking traps where they are drugged, kidnapped, raped, and the violence is videotaped and sold to businesses and stores who sell pornography across the world.”

Buyers of pornography and prostitution continue to fuel the market, which gives revenue to traffickers that are victimizing girls and boys that are being sold for profit. The children who are being victimized are not being viewed by a trafficker as a daughter, son, friend, or family member, but instead, as an estimated \$300,000 yearly profit for them. “How You Can Fight Human Trafficking” has testimonies of victims and traffickers and estimated that profit in 2014, with the market only continuing to grow.

Shared Hope International, an organization that aims to end Sex Trafficking, reports the following on California law regarding human trafficking, “California law prohibits the criminalization of minors for prostitution, but provides minimal penalties for prosecuting demand. The human trafficking law protects victims

of child sex trafficking without requiring proof of force, fraud, or coercion.

However, paying for sex acts with a minor and benefitting financially from assisting or enabling sex trafficking are not punishable under the trafficking law.” Human Sex Trafficking is rape, it is coercion, it is selling others into sexual acts to make a profit, and it is a crime that is reported as being the second largest criminal industry in the world.

Eradicating Human Sex Trafficking needs to begin somewhere; let that somewhere be here, in our own community, within our own circle of friends, within our own homes. It is an uncomfortable topic that needs more lines of communication open.

Enable an open line of communication regarding how to eradicate the problem by not shutting down the possibility that it is happening around you. Visit the organizations listed above to find links to share on your social media accounts. Talk about how pornography and prostitution create a demand for Human Sex Trafficking.

Good Samaritans Saved My Life

Picking up my medication prescription refills one lazy afternoon landed me instead in the Emergency Room (ER) at Kaiser Downey. Thanks to Cerritos Kaiser pharmacy assistant, Erica Pianedo, and the medical staff of this satellite facility of Kaiser.

My unexpected medical saga started while waiting to get my two prescriptions at the pharmacy two weeks ago. Erica Pianedo was processing my order, when unexpectedly I jerked for couple of seconds with a sharp chest pain. Curious, Ms. Pianedo asked, “Are you all right?”

I said I was fine. I told her, “This episode happens every now and then.” I was about to pay for my order when I was jolted again by a piercing pain but it ceased anew.

Worried, Ms. Pianedo advised me to sit down so she could order a wheelchair to take me to the medical office on the second floor for medical attention. Right away, the security guard brought me a wheelchair, and LVN Alejandra Frias ushered me into the examination room. She checked my vital signs like blood pressure and temperature. She also set up an EKG machine.

In a few minutes, Registered Nurse Amy Lou came in to administer the EKG, printed the results and handed it to Dr. Jennifer Tan who interpreted the results. Dr. Tan explained the results that my EKG was abnormal. The staff advised me that it was risky for me to drive home by myself and ordered an ambulance to bring me to ER at Kaiser Downey for fur-

ther treatment.

Before the arrival of the ambulance, RN Amy Lou set up an intravenous procedure in preparation for blood tests at Kaiser’s ER. Not long after, two paramedics arrived.

In no time, I arrived at Kaiser Downey. I was administered another EKG, x-ray, blood work, pain relievers intravenously and Losartan for my blood pressure which I forgot to take that day. My blood pressure was high at 143/101.

In no time and to make a long story short, I was stabilized and everything became normal again. I was sent home that late evening after a scary episode.

In the midst of this emergency situation, I asked for their names including the paramedics Gabriel Navarro and Daniel Fernandez to thank them. These men and women are unsung heroes and heroines of the day whose jobs are to save lives. Their due diligence and efficient handling of emergency medical procedures are so exemplary and praiseworthy in aiding a total stranger like me. And the medical personnel came from all race and cultural backgrounds. It reminds me that in America, we are all inclusive and equal in the eyes of God.

Whenever my friends learned what happened to me, they ribbed me that I was always in love, I responded: true I was always in love with God because he always saved me from imminent danger through the hands of those who administered to me.

I’m reminded of the parable of the Good Samaritan as told by Jesus in Luke 10:30–37. It was about a traveler from Jerusalem to Jericho who was stripped of clothing, beaten, robbed and left half dead alongside the road. First, a priest and then a Levite passed by, but both avoided the man. Finally, a Samaritan passerby happened to see the injured man, moved to pity and unselfishly aided him.

Around and About: Musical Instrument Museum

So, at the Juarez Read Aloud, Maynard and I were talking about our impending mini-road trip to Spring Training when Marty joined in the conversation. “Be sure to visit the Musical Instrument Museum in Phoenix,” he said. “It is a hidden gem which is well worth the time. Just be sure to allow several hours to do it justice.”

Thus began what became yet another moment in our travels. You know, moments are those unexpected slivers of excellent events which happen in our travels that leave a strong and lasting impression.

The next day we drove the 364 mostly boring miles (have you ever driven through Blythe or 150 miles of nothing but cactus and 92 mph speeders?) to our hotel in Tempe right next door to the football stadium at Arizona State University.

We had a loosely planned three days that included visits to the Dodgers or Angels at three different stadia in the vicinity. Harkening back to Marty’s suggestion, we googled the Museum and found it to be somewhat near to our Sunday game so we decided to make a quick swing through before it started.

So much for our best laid plans. Turns out that the Museum of Musical Instruments—known as MIM to those in the know which

now includes you - displays more than 6,800 instruments collected from 200 countries, territories, hamlets, burgs and huts around the world.

Their website notes that “most displays are enhanced by state-of-the-art audio and video technologies that allow guests to see the instruments, hear their sounds, and observe them being played in their original contexts—performances that are often as spectacular as the instruments themselves.

What’s more, all guests are invited to play instruments from around the world in the Experience Gallery. They can also see instruments from music icons such as John Lennon, Taylor Swift, Elvis Presley®, Carlos Santana, and many more in the Artist Gallery.

While somewhat downplayed, the roots of MIM spring from the originally modest collection and vision of Robert J. Ulrich, former CEO and chairman emeritus of Target Corporation founder of Target stores – an instrument collector who became an instrument hoarder to the point that it became necessary to move his items into a gorgeous structure.

Together with a fellow collector, Marc Felix, he created a museum and collection that gives equal representation to the musi-

cal instruments and music of every country in the world. Using state-of-the-art audiovisual technology to show musical instruments being played in their original cultural context and delivering the sound of these instruments through high-quality headphones, MIM provides a one-of-a-kind experience to museum guests.

MIM’s collection was assembled by five expert curators, with consultation from distinguished ethnomusicologists, organologists, and other esoteric experts. The bulk of the collection is highlighted in Geographic Galleries that focus on five major global locales. The museum opened its doors in 2010 and has been leading the parade of similar museums around the world since then.

We started our tour by slowly visiting each of the dozens of displays, watching the fascinating films and reading the explanatory notes below each instrument. As the time ticked on, we accelerated our pace, barely finishing our visit with an obligatory stop at the MIM store to buy an authentic CD of Bluegrass music.

Next time you find yourself in Phoenix be sure to add the MIM to your visit list and add to your catalog of moments.




