Hawaiian Gardens residents and visitors began lining up along Carson Street at 9 a.m. impatiently waiting for the parade to begin. They weren't disappointed.

There were marching bands, drill teams, floats and dignitaries riding in vintage and current automobiles that included Grand Marshall Leonardo Cuellar and Cerritos College President Jose Fierro.

New Projects in Cerritos to Generate Significant Sales, **Property Tax Revenues**

Several new projects in Cerritos are currently underway, which are anticipated to generate significant sales and property tax revenues for the City of Cerritos.

The Aria luxury apartments located on Artesia Boulevard and Bloomfield Avenue were completed in 2016. The Picerne Group, which developed Aria, invested \$50 million in the project. To support municipal services to the residents, the property owner will make an annual payment of \$45,000 to the City. It is estimated that the residents of Aria will generate \$42,000 annually in sales tax revenue for the City.

Construction continues on the Sage luxury apartments adjacent to Aria. The Richman Group has invested \$43 million in the project. Similar to the Aria project, the City will receive an annual payment from the Sage property owner to support municipal services to the residents.

There will be an initial payment of \$39,600, and the amount will be adjusted annually based on the Consumer Price Index, with a minimum yearly increase of 2 percent and a maximum annual increase of 5 percent. The payment will be in perpetuity. It is estimated that the residents of Sage will generate \$40,000 annually in sales tax revenue for the City. The project is expected to be completed in 2017.

New developments continue at the Los Cerritos Center, which has seen an investment of more than \$45 million by property owner Macerich during the past two years. In September 2016, Chipotle Mexican Grill opened, located north of Macy's. Seattle-based pizza chain Mod Pizza will open at the mall later this year next to Chipotle.

P.F. Chang's China Bistro is expected to open by Thanksgiving in the space previously occupied by Red Robin. Sales tax revenue from the Los Cerritos Center averaged approximately \$1 million per quarter in 2016. Projected sales tax revenue for the first quarter of 2017 is \$850,000.

Approximately \$113 million has been invested in Plaza 183 by the developer since 2015, when the shopping center completed extensive façade and landscape improvements. New tenants also opened for business, including Nordstrom Rack, Saks Fifth Avenue Off Fifth and Old Navy.

Current projects include two new restaurants, which will replace the former El Torito Restaurant. Completion is

ABC District Update Given at Cerritos Chamber of Commerce Luncheon

ABC Unified School District Superintendent Dr. Mary Sieu and members of her staff presented a report on the State of the District to members of the Chamber of Commerce at its monthly luncheon held on March 29.

"We are pleased," she said, "that the district's graduation rate is at 98 percent. Our mission at ABC is to develop a community of life-long learners, creative thinkers and responsible individuals by providing innovative and high quality educational programs."

"We have a five-year strategic plan," she explained, "that focuses on raising student achievement, academic excellence, dealing with emotional student issues and having effective resource management in our system."

Board President Christopher Apodaca said all five ABC Middle Schools have been designated "Schools to Watch," which are are high performing model schools that demonstrate academic excellence, and re-

sponsiveness to student needs and social equity.

"The schools must complete an extensive application that is reviewed by middle grade experts to earn this designation," he explained, "and are also re-evaluated every three years in order to retain the designation."

Turning to the District's high schools, he said Whitney High School is recognized as one of the highest ranking schools in the Country. Another high school to watch is Artesia. "It has gone through a major transition under Principal Sergio Garcia that has been written about in the Huntington Post," he said.

Apodaca also praised Tracy High School whose students, he said, deserve a life of what they are capable of achieving and not the other way around. He described the District's Adult Education School as responding to the needs of the community both for students and adults.

Dr. Sieu explained the state has a new accountability

system for grading students, known as Dashboard, which she said has a color grading system with blue being the highest performance ban, green which is the state average, and red, which is the lowest. She said, "ABC color ban is either green or a blue."

Dr. Rhonda Buss, Director of Secondary Schools, discussed career education, noting the state is focusing on a college and career radius.

"Last year ABC was for-

tunate to receive a \$1.4 million grant that was used to update equipment and facilities at our high schools. We recently received a second grant of \$1.3 million to continue our efforts," she said.

"When students graduate, teachers want a seamless transition from high school to college. To this end, we convened a second seminar where we had college and business representatives along with our counselors, and teachers dis-

cussing what we should be doing for our kids to further their careers."

Dr. Colon Sprigg, in charge of ABC's technology, said in October 2015 ABC established a framework with the goal that every school in the district would have access to the internet. He said Dr. Sieu and the Board of Education have done just that. "By 2020 we expect to have access for all students." He added, "It's a great time to be in education."

Cerritos College Trustee Drayer Announces Retirement

The Cerritos Community College District announced today that Board of Trustees member John Paul Drayer will retire from the Board as of April 19, 2017 after four years of service. He is also retiring from Los Angeles Unified School District where he currently teaches on April 11. Drayer has been an educator for 30 years.

Drayer was elected to the Cerritos College Board of Trustees in November 2012 to serve the remainder of an unexpired term vacated by the late Bob Epple. He was reelected in November 2014. Drayer represents Trustee Area 3, which includes portions of the cities of Bellflower, Cerritos, Downey, and South Gate.

"I'm looking forward to spending more time with family, friends, and to traveling to Hawaii, New Zealand and parts of the Southern Hemisphere that I haven't seen. I want to explore and study new things," said Drayer. "I will be taking care of our family businesses and closing probate so that my family and I can finish the grieving process over the loss of my father," he continued.

Drayer graduated from Cerritos College in 1984 with an A.A. degree in Political Science and Business. He later transferred to California State University, Long Beach and earned a B.A. and teaching credentials. Drayer received his M.A. in Education Counseling and counseling credentials from California State University, Dominguez Hills.

"For his four years of service to the Board of Trustees, we want to thank Trustee Drayer for his contributions and leadership to the District and wish him well in his retirement," said Dr. Jose Fierro, president/superintendent.

Cerritos College Holds Groundbreaking For New Health and Welfare Complex

Cerritos College celebrated the groundbreaking of the new Health and Wellness Complex on April 5.

The approximately \$51million project is funded by Measure G Bond dollars and will be located immediately south of Falcon Gymnasium, along the western edge of the campus' athletic precinct.

The 76,000-gross-squarefoot facility will centralize functions including fitness labs, cardio workout rooms,

studios, offices, and the Student Health Center that are currently dispersed around campus, into an accessible, more efficient, state-of-the-art complex.

The complex will consist of five new buildings: Athletic Team Room Building, Dance Building, Fitness Building, Hall of Fame Building, Health Services Building, and Physical Education Building. Construction is expected to be

Functioning as the home base for all athletic and physical education activities, the new Health & Wellness Complex will provide a much needed expansion of laboratory, classroom, office and support spaces tailored to the needs of the College's robust physical education and athletic programs.

It was 1 p.m. when my MY FRIEND FROM FRUIT-CAKE, FLORIDA walked into my office. "Ready for lunch?" he asked.

"Yep," I answered.

"There's a restaurant down by the beach," he said, "and the food is excellent."

Twenty minutes later as we settled down at our table and placed our order, he said, I understand you attended an open house recently at Artesia High School.

"That's correct," I said. "Why do you ask?"

"I was at a friend's house," he explained, "and he had mentioned it to several people in attendance. They expressed interest in the event."

"Well," I said, "Artesia High has an enrollment of 1,460 students, of which 326 are seniors. Both the students and teachers were eager to show off their campus. As Melinda Kimsey, and I toured the campus, we were impressed by the enthusiasm of both students and staff about their school. Principal, Sergio Garcia, who has been there since 2005, explained when he arrived, the school's morale was down, and many students were indifferent to their studies. He said changes were made over a period of time, and now staff and students take pride in their school.

My FRIEND paused in his questioning for a moment, then

asked, "What impressed you the most during your visit?"

"I think it was the school's Biomedical Science Classes," I said. "The program gives the students exciting hands-on projects and problems. It's a three-year program designed to provide an overview of all the courses in biomedical sciences, laying the scientific foundations for subsequent courses."

"What else?" he asked. I explained that in the second year students study the human body system, working through real-world cases, using data acquisition."

"It sounds more like a college course!" he exclaimed. "You know while today's parents are strong school supporters, I don't believe they have any idea what modern technology in the classroom is affording their kids. What else impressed you?" he asked.

"In the physics class, we met students doing a demonstration about atoms and molecules and watched biotechnology students dissect a lamb's heart,"

I could tell MY FRIEND **FROM** FRUITCAKE, FLORIDA was becoming overwhelmed. I quickly explained the last room we visited. The classroom had been turned into a video studio. "There were two students on stage," I explained, "with a camera picking up their movement and voices. In another room another student was monitoring their moves on a video screen. My Friend was quiet for a moment. Finally he said, "I think I've got a lot more research to do before I try to explain what is happening in today's classroom."

The Taiwan Experience Education program will be hosted by Southern Taiwan University of Science and Technology (STUST) located in Tainan, Taiwan. The program is sponsored by Ministry of Education (MOE) of Taiwan and Tainan City Government (TCG). THese 20 students and 20 students from Australia were selected to par-

Leal's LEAP Presents International Festival



Guests are also invited to explore the entire Aquarium (except Lorikeet Forest), including the new Seal and Sea Lion Habitat that features a stunning design that get you even closer to the animals! The exhibit features new rockwork and a coastal seascape mural and new, curved viewing window that allows animals and guests to come face to face.

The Aquarium also recently introduced a new addition to its Southern California/Baja Gallery, a baby giant sea bass. This small fish was the result of a spawning event this past fall and was raised in a tank behind the scenes during its early months.

Giant sea bass are difficult to breed in aquarium environments. Only one other facility has had preliminary success in breeding giant sea bass. At its hatching, the baby fish was just 4 millimeters long. Now, it is about two inches long and is fed on a diet of mysid shrimp. It will take about fifteen years for this juvenile to reach its full adult size (up to 6 feet long and 500 pounds).

The Aquarium is home to three adult giant sea bass, a wellestablished male-female pair that has been at the Aquarium since its



opening and a younger male. All three are residents of the Honda Blue Cavern exhibit in the Great Hall. The well-established pair are the baby's parents. Senior Aquarist Nicole Leier gathered research on breeding this species in an aquarium environment, and she and other husbandry staff members made several adjustments to the Blue Cavern exhibit to achieve success.

The Aquarium's work to reproduce this species is particularly important because giant sea bass are listed as Critically Endangered on the International Union for Conservation of Nature's Red List.

Visitors can also see the Aquarium's 11,000 other marine animals, including penguins, sea otters, and sea dragons as well as touch sea jellies, rays, and sharks.
